Responses to our annual appeal are still coming in. This year the committee choose to fund house and gardens as we ran into a slight deficit last year. The committee also decided to have annual appeal money to go to scholarship.

We are creating several new scholarships of which one will be the Dr. Ruth Oakley scholarship. Also, we are picking up a New York State sponsored EOF Fund. This fund was started by Bettie Lindley and Carol Adams back in 2003. We now have \$12, 555. In it and we need to raise \$22,445 more before we can establish a fellowship for graduated interns.



On Monday November 11, 2013, the *New York Times* published an article about an exhibit, "Honoring Female Pioneers in Science," now on display at the Grolier Club in New York City.

It's awesome that the newspaper is acknowledging such an important topic. If AAUW's founders were alive today, no doubt they would be thrilled about women in science making national news! Then again, perhaps AAUW members of yore would not be surprised to see some of the same women they supported featured in the Times. After all, AAUW has been recognizing and supporting women in science since our inception in 1881.

Did you know AAUW fellowships, grants, and awards were behind almost half of the 32 women featured in that article?



Marie Curie

AAUW members contributed toward the purchase of a gram of radium for Curie in 1920. More importantly, after Curie's death, brilliant AAUW minds worked through the legal system to ensure that the remaining

funds were used for their original purpose, thereby creating the Marie Curie Fellowship for a woman studying physics, chemistry, or radiology.

Barbara McClintock

McClintock received the Nobel Prize in medicine in 1983 for her groundbreaking work in genetics with the discovery of "jumping genes."



She was previously recognized by AAUW for those same discoveries not one or two years prior... but 36 years before, in 1947!






Chien-Shiung Wu

Realizing that this Chinese physicist was overlooked for the Nobel Prize for her groundbreaking work in overturning a then-widely accepted

"law" of physics, AAUW first wrote about the injustice and then recognized her in 1959 with our highest honor, the Achievement Award.

AAUW Public Policy



Since its founding in 1881, AAUW has been breaking through barriers for women and girls. We applauded the military's recent decision to officially open combat positions to women. AAUW executive director, Linda Hallman, a proud nine-year veteran of the United States Army wrote,

"Women want to serve and have been serving in combat. We owe them recognition, equal

treatment, and our full support." The decision to open these combat positions to women is a reflection of military leadership recognizing the value of the critical skills women bring to our modern military workforce.

As President Obama remarked, "This milestone reflects the courageous and patriotic service of women through more than two centuries of American history and the indispensable role of women in today's military." However, to maintain a strong military, we must address the problem of sexual harassment and violence all too common among women and men who seek to serve our country.

According to the Pentagon, nearly 3,000 women were sexually assaulted in 2008, yet the Pentagon also estimates that "80% to 90% of sexual assaults go unreported." New research by the Department of Veterans Affairs has found that sexual harassment is at epidemic levels in conflict zones, with half of the women sent to Iraq or Afghanistan reporting being sexually harassed, and nearly one in four reporting sexual assault. This is unacceptable and must change. Through accountability, education, and a robust prosecution system, we can end sexual assault in the military.

Subtitle E—Sexual Assault Prevention and Response and Military Justice Matters

PART I—Sexual Assault Prevention and Response

Domestic Violence (DV)

Domestic Violence is a pattern of abusive behavior in any relationship that is used by one partner to gain or maintain power and control over another partner.

Domestic violence can be physical, sexual, emotional, economic, or psychological actions or threats of actions that harm another person.

- 1 in 4 Women will experience domestic violence in her lifetime
- 1 in 7 Men will experience domestic violence in his lifetime1

Domestic violence data should be viewed with caution, recognizing an estimated 70% of domestic violence incidents go unreported.

In 2012, approximately 194,800 Domestic Violence (DV) crisis/hotline calls were received by individual providers across New York State.

There were 78 reports of domestic violence per 10,000 residents in Monroe County, well above the state (excluding New York City) rate of 49. The rate in the City of Rochester is 143, nearly three times the state rate.


Of the average 6,100 domestic violence reports made in each of the last four years, 54% were in the City of Rochester and 46% were in the suburbs.

Recognizing the need for specialized supports for victims of domestic violence and their children, the New York State Domestic Violence Prevention Act became law in 1987. This law requires social services districts to provide shelter and services to victims of domestic violence.

Over the last four years, Alternatives for Battered Women's (ABW) Hotline received an average of 4,800 calls each year or 400 calls per month.

Over 490 individuals stayed at ABW's emergency shelter in 2012 – 288 women and 202 children. In addition, over 400 community members participated in support groups and individual counseling.

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Tuesday & Wednesday, December 10-11 – STEM meeting


Time: 7:30 – 10:30 p.m. Perkins Mansion
