Dr. Roksolana Kuchma to Speak at Branch Meeting on Tuesday, November 8

Roksolana Kuchma, MD, MBA will discuss her work with refugees in Rochester, which is one of the largest settlement sites for refugees in Western New York. Dr. Kuchma believes that women, who are a large majority of this refugee population, do not always receive the care and respect they deserve. Thus she considers reaching out to and educating them with high quality health prevention and treatment a vital part of her work. Moreover, teaching leadership skills to the new generation of young

girls/women helps raise their aspirations for elevated cultural and social status.

A native of Ukraine, our speaker came to the Rochester area with her family as a teenager when the Soviet Union dissolved. After graduating from West Irondequoit High School, she pursued her medical studies at K. Marcinkowski University of Medical Sciences in Poland. She then completed her residency training in family medicine at the University of Rochester School of Medicine where she received a fellowship in Geriatric Medicine. She also received her MBA degree at the University of Rochester's Simon School of Business.

Dr. Kuchma is Medical Director of the Refugee Program at the Brown Square Anthony Jordan Health Center. She also is a faculty member in the Department of Geriatrics and Aging at the University of Rochester School of Medicine. At the Health Center, in addition to seeing refugee patients, Dr. Kuchma develops new community outreach programs and works with local colleges and universities to promote awareness of refugee communities among college students.

Conversing on Diversity: An Exchange of New ideas, New language and New Consciousness

There is a celebration of the living and the dead in November. In most countries of the Catholic faith, November 1st is All Saint's Day and November 2nd is All Soul's Day. In Mexico and most countries of Hispanic origin, there is a special Day of the Dead, called El Dia de Muertos. This brings all of us to a deeper consciousness of our mortality and immortality, which is also heightened during this season of autumn as leaves change colors and fall to the ground. This is a most appropriate segue to our holistic presentation of Age-ing as Sage-ing.

Holistic Health Wellness

GRAB AAUW at UNAR Visiting Journalists Conference: Freedom of the Press: Empower Women & Girls

GRAB AAUW was pleased to support the United Nations Association of Rochester (UNAR) on Monday, October 3 as it hosted its annual Visiting Journalists Conference at The Strong National Museum of Play.

This year's theme made for a perfect collaboration: "Freedom of the Press: Empower Women & Girls". On hand at the chapter's display table and exhibit promoting GRAB were Lorraine Cappellino and Beverly Vaughan. They represented us well, expressing the synergy between the day's event and AAUW's mission to *advance equity for women and girls*.

The featured guests were 14 journalists, a mix of women and men, from the countries of Bahamas, Barbados, Cameroon, Croatia, Gambia, Georgia, Ghana, Kiribati, Oman, Palau, Swaziland, the Republic of Tajikistan, the United Arab Emirates, and the Democratic Republic of Congo. On a United States tour, they were sponsored by the United Nations Department of Public Information Reham Al-Farra Memorial Journalists' Fellowship Programme. While in the Rochester area 3-day home stays were arranged by UNAR volunteers, as well as a luncheon at Max's, boat ride on the Erie Canal, and visits to the George Eastman House and Niagara Falls. Most notably, they were featured on the October 3rd WXXI 1370 Connection and interviewed by host Bob Smith.

Among the more that 100 adults and youth from local municipalities, as well as students from high schools, colleges and universities enrolled was our own Marlene Gordon. She attended breakout sessions that focused (from a global perspective) on the depiction and representation of females within society by the media. The overarching question posed: Does the media help or hurt the empowerment women and girls? The topics discussed included: education, health care, children, marriage, religion, jobs, economic independence, and ethnicity. Her Excellency Lyutha Sultan al-Mughairy of Oman served as the guest lecturer. During her talk she shared experiences from her extensive career in politics, journalism, as a United Nations information officer, and now as an Ambassador to the UN.


