Historian Mary Q. Chapin to Speak at Branch Meeting on Tuesday, October 11

Mary Chapin will tell the story of two of the most dynamic personalities of the 1800s. Susan B. Anthony had given her life to work for abolition of slavery and women's rights. Now, in the Kansas of 1867, she was alone and bitterly persecuted on all sides. Enter George Francis Train who was tall, dark, handsome, wealthy and gregarious. He was famous for his life of business acumen and daring, and he admired Miss Anthony.

They campaigned for a woman's right to vote in Kansas and almost won. It was Train's financial support that created Anthony's newspaper, *The Revolution*. Anthony was criticized for her relationship with the controversial

Mr. Train. Their warm friendship ended only with his death in 1904.

Mrs. Chapin came to New York in 1956 as a young wife and immediately embarked on a course of civic action that she sustained and expanded through decades of service to the community. She graduated *magna cum laude* from Binghamton University, majoring in Peace Studies and Conflict Resolution. That interest was mirrored in her distinguished career as Senior Personnel Administrator for the NYS public sector, where she was recognized for her excellence with the Governor's Office of Labor Management Award. She served as President of Dispute Resolution International and was appointed a Labor Arbitrator by the American Arbitration Association.

From 2001-2006 Mrs. Chapin served as the first female host of WUTR's popular Mohawk Valley Seniors, the longest running show in the Mohawk Valley. She is probably best known for her tireless historical work. As co-chair of the Mohawk Valley Women's History Project, she spearheaded a six-year campaign for a Day of Commemoration for Susan B. Anthony. Governor George F. Pataki signed the Bill into law on November 5, 2004.

Mary was Past President of the Utica/Rome Metro League of Women Voters and served one term as Vice President of the Mohawk Valley Branch of AAUW.

Mary Chapin is listed in *Who's Who in American Women* and *Who's Who in the World*, served as a Governor-appointed Trustee for Mohawk Valley Community College (MVCC) and in 2007 Senator Joseph A. Griffo honored her as one of NYS Women of Distinction.

Mary is the author of several women's history plays including *Women's Suffrage*: A *Dream of Full Citizenship*, and *Susan B. Anthony's Work for Abolition of Slavery*. She teaches Women's History classes for the Mohawk Valley Institute of Learning in Retirement.

College and University Partners by Barbara LeSavoy

Dr. Barbara LeSavoy, Chair of GRAB /AAUW College and University Partners and Director of Women and Gender Studies at The College at Brockport has been selected as Institute Fellow under a two-year SUNY NEH funded COIL Institute for Globally Networked Learning in the Humanities, partnering with Novgorod State University in Russia.

COIL (Collaborative Online International Learning) Institute for Globally Networked Learning in the Humanities, funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH), selected LeSavoy to become part of this two-year project. COIL received nearly forty institutional grant applications from colleges and universities across the United States. LeSavoy at Brockport, in partnership with Dr. Elena Lukovitskaya at Novgorod State University in Russia, are one of twenty-two teams selected to work together as Institute Fellows. The project supports the collaboration of faculty, instructional designers, international programs staff and administrators from academic institutions in the US and abroad, who will develop courses to teach and share knowledge from a global perspective.

LeSavoy and Lukovitskaya, working under the group, "Human Societies: College at Brockport/Novgorod State University, Russia," will use blended technology to mount a globally networked course, "Sex and Gender Across Cultures," likely live for spring '12 or fall '12. LeSavoy and Lukovitskaya are scheduled to attend a COIL seminar at the SUNY Global Center in NYC in September where their work will begin in earnest.

Also from College and University Partners, "My Brockport" a new College at Brockport campus web-based resource for students recently added a link to AAUW College University Partners, making this resource visible to students. As an AAUW college/university partner, all Brockport students have e-student affiliate membership to AAUW, and with this, access to AAUW resources, including leadership and professional development connections; fellowships, grants, and scholarships; and opportunities for networking and outreach on campus and beyond. Lesavoy, college/university partner chair, hopes to disseminate this e-template to other area colleges holding college/university membership status to make this AAUW resource more visible to students/faculty/staff.

The topic is Sage-ing, a change of paradigm from Aging to Sage-ing by creating a community of leaders to transmit the wisdom of Sage-ing.
