World Health Day is celebrated on April 7. The theme for 2013 is high blood pressure. Though it affects more than one in three adults worldwide, it remains largely hidden.



Many people do not know they have high blood pressure because it does not always cause symptoms. As a result, it leads to more than nine million deaths every year, including about half of all deaths due to heart disease and stroke.

#### In the United States, about 77.9 million (1 out of every 3) adults have high blood pressure.

- 81.5 % are aware they have it
- 74.9 % are under current treatment
- 52.5 % have it controlled
- 47.5 % do not have it controlled

## National Decision Health Day: April 16

All adults can benefit from thinking about what their healthcare choices would be if they were unable to speak for themselves. These decisions can be written down in an advance directive so that others know what they are. Advance directives come in two main forms:

A "healthcare power of attorney" (or "proxy" or "surrogate") documents the person you select to be your voice for your healthcare decisions if you cannot speak for yourself.

A "living will" documents what kinds of medical treatments you would or would not want at the end of life.


