Public Policy News Violence Against Women (VAW) Violence Against Women Act is

Key facts:

- Violence against women particularly intimate partner violence and sexual violence against women - are major public health problems and violations of women's human rights.
- A WHO multi-country study found that between 15-71% of women aged 15-49 years reported physical and/or sexual violence by an intimate partner at some point in their lives.
- These forms of violence can result in physical, mental, sexual, reproductive health and other health problems, and may increase vulnerability to HIV.
- Risk factors for being a perpetrator also include exposure low education. past to child maltreatment or witnessing violence in the family, harmful use of alcohol, attitudes accepting of violence and gender inequality.
- Risk factors for being a victim of intimate partner and sexual violence include low education, witnessing violence between parents, exposure to abuse during childhood and attitudes accepting violence and gender inequality.
- In high-income settings, school-based programmes to prevent relationship violence among young people (or dating violence) are supported by some evidence of effectiveness.
- In low-income settings, other primary prevention strategies, such as microfinance combined with gender equality training and community-based initiatives that address gender inequality and communication and relationship skills, hold promise.
- Situations of conflict, post conflict and displacement may exacerbate existing violence and present new forms of violence against women.

Overdue for Re-authorization

The election is over, but now the real work begins. The Congress left a lot of important work undone, and I don't mean just the so-called "fiscal cliff" that is dominating the news.

Chief among these bits of unfinished work is VAWA - the Violence Against Women Act - which has traditionally had bi-partisan and near-unanimous support for 18 years. The Senate passed the Reauthorization Act (S. 1925) in April, but it is stuck in the House.

What are the main issues?

The House version (H.R. 4970) excludes key improvements that were included in the Senate version. These include:

- Provisions to improve the safety of college campuses.
- Rejection of protections for men and women who are lesbian, gay, bisexual or transgender, making it difficult for them to find services in their communities.
- Elimination of strong protections and justice for women and children who are beaten or abused on Tribal lands by perpetrators who are not members of a particular tribe.
- Removal of a key requirement that would more easily allow victims to move from one subsidized housing program to another in order to avoid an abuser.

Want to take action to move this along?

We need GOP leadership behind a Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) reauthorization before the end of the 112th Congress.




Carol Lea Benjamin


DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE REPORT
