Public Policy



his month's topic on Public Policy will I prove to be thought-provoking! The goal is to build a clear understanding of why it is necessary for organizations such as ours to have a Public Policy Committee. How does public policy impact decisions made on the state, local and national levels as well as the non-profit community. What can we do to influence how public policy is shaped and what services get delivered and to whom?

These are some questions raised when discussing such a topic as Public Policy. Our speaker this month is senior Vice President of Public Policy Katherine Astrich.

Katherine is senior vice president of public policy and mobilization for the Alliance. She previously worked as a consultant for The Lewin Group, a national health and human services consulting firm. She has advocated for Medicaid, early education, and workforce assistance programs that benefit vulnerable children and families.

Her expertise includes regulatory and information collection policy. During her 8-year tenure with the Office of Management and Budget, she oversaw executive branch evaluations of regulations related to low-income and immigrant programs, and led White House teams on program evaluation and cross-agency coordination.

She received her master's degree in public policy from Duke University and bachelor's degrees in government and psychology from the University of Virginia.

She sat as past president on the board and was on the transition team and on the GRAB-AAUW Charitable Trust Board. To prove Beverly's passion for the house and its preservation, she even drove downtown, alone, at night to speak to the Preservation Board against the 10-car garage proposed at 474 East Avenue. She was finally satisfied, after much to-do, with the smaller garage and the beautiful landscaping that will be put (pro bono) behind the garage on our property. Her main concern and unfinished business of the project was the landscaping that goes from the rear lot line of 474 to our carriage house. So, my friends, I challenge you to donate to the house in memory of Beverly Barr Vaughan (makes checks payable to GRAB-AAUW Charitable Trust) to have the landscaping along the west driveway all the way back to our carriage house finished. I will personally pledge the difference if for enough money if that goal is not met.

This summer the Women Helping Girls mentors and mentorees had the opportunity to travel to WomenHelpingGirls Washington, DC to meet the



first lady **Michelle Obama**. The purpose of the trip was educational, social and rewarding for a successful academic school year. There were 11 girls and 8 mentors attending the field trip. The girls were selected based on their grade point average. Komekia Peterson, was one of the mentors and she describes the experience below:

Tnitially when I reviewed the detailed itinerary given by the **⊥** travel agent I was a little nervous to embark and lead this trip to one of the most popular cities for tourist in the US, Washington, DC. The itinerary was jam-packed with activities beginning immediately upon our arrival. The morning of the trip however eased my nerves. All of the participants, young people and adults, were present and excited about this adventure at the early departure time of 6 AM.

Friday afternoon we arrived at the Capitol for a guided tour. The tour was educational as well as enlightening. After the tour we enjoyed great food and fellowship at the legendary Hard Rock Café. 
Saturday, October 25, 2014 District 2 Conference
