
Our GRAB AAUW chapter does not support eliminating educational requirements for membership.



Immigration Community Conversation Re-Cap

On March 4, 2015 Regine Calver facilitated a brown bag lunch on immigration at the Perkins Mansion. The well attended event drew 18 women from many different cultures and ethnicities. The discussion focused on barriers to immigration since 1965 when President Lyndon Johnson signed the Immigration law still in place today. Many of the women shared their personal hardships while in refugee camps and when applying for citizenship. Regine taught us that although the law was intended to improve the opportunity for those with needed skills and close ties to America, it was fraught with barriers that blocked many hopeful refugees from coming here. For example, each candidate had to follow more than 30 bureaucratic steps. Any one misstep might disqualify someone. Also, translation problems during the all-important interview and the subjectivity of civil servants easily displaced opportunities for new Americans. So how did some survive this labyrinthine process? According to those present, it was faith that helped them navigate and endure. This **Community Conversation on immigration enlightened me** on many of the struggles of women from all over the world. Hence, we as women have an obligation to ensure our policies don't hinder freedom and liberty for both women and children. - Gwen Clifton


