# FROM OUR PRESIDENT, GAYNELLE WETHERS

What a fantastic summer! Gorgeous weather! Good food! Good friends! Good times! ...All evidenced by many of your Facebook postings and shared stories.

This summer, a President's Summer Series was launched during the month of August. In partnership with the 21st Century Arts President and CEO, Rachel DeGuzman, we held discussions on Diversity in the Arts. Our conversations with panelists proved to be interactive and a "safe space" was created to discuss those tough but necessary dialogues which left participants wanting more.

Since the Summer series was so successful, we are launching the President's Fall Film Festival Series focusing on Sexual Assaults on Campus. There is a new documentary film, "Teens and Assault," which will be released in the fall and offered free on Netflix to organizations such as AAUW. The second film we plan to introduce will be on Transgender issues, which is timely and long overdue.

During its annual Retreat deliberations, the Board identified this year's theme as "Trends and Issues," thus giving programming some provocative topics.

Naturally, researching speakers led me to some interesting articles beginning with James Goodman's D&C article, "Ex-HWS Student Contests Expulsion in Court," to Emma Pettit's article regarding the rape culture in football, to sports journalist Jessica Luther. Luther has written a book due out in September on un-sportsman-like conduct entitled College Football and the Politics of Rape. And yes, I have ordered mine from Amazon.

On a different subject, I saw Dr. Cornel West on one of my favorite talk shows and felt disappointed. Then, I ran across an article by Michael Eric Dyson, "What Happened to America's Most Exciting Black Scholar?" *Now it becomes clear!* 

Another headline which captured my attention in the Catholic Reporter was about Black Catholic Leaders wanting stronger church responses to police killings. *Silence no longer!* 

I would be remiss if I didn't mention Francis Institute's Commission to Study Female Deacons, appointing gender balanced memberships, by journalist Joshua McElwee. *Way to go, Francis!* 

These are truly exciting and challenging times in which we live.

This summer, I served on the Advisory Committee for the National Conference on Race and Ethnicity in American Higher Education, in preparation for our conference next year. As always, each year it is insightful, energizing and thought-provoking to connect with faculty and staff colleagues across the nation, creating and planning around topics that will impact our colleges and university campuses.

In closing, we have had a request for members who are able to bring a box a diapers to various branch programs and events throughout the Fall. The Women Helping Girls are collecting diapers to be repackaged for distribution to assist the Emergency Family Assistance Program at Baden Street Settlement at Thanksgiving time.





## JENNIFER LINDLEY FOUNDATION NEWS

The eleventh annual Jennifer Grimes Lindley scholarship reception was this August. This year two scholarships were awarded, one to Courtney Popielarz, and another to Siobhan Plouffe.

Courtney graduated from Hilton High School and will attend the Rochester Institute of Technology and major in computer engineering.

Siobhan graduated from West Irondequoit High School and will attend the University of Rochester and major in audio and music engineering.


Each girl received one thousand dollars and a four-year membership in AAUW. Each girl's name will be listed on the Lindley scholarship plaque.

The scholarship winner must be a female pursuing a degree in the physical sciences or engineering. The money can be used for any purpose and is awarded for the first year of college.

GRAB AAUW's Educational Loan Fund makes the selection and the Rochester Area Community Foundation administers the finances.

The scholarship is in memory of Jennifer Grimes Lindley who had just completed her term as GRAB AAUW Secretary when she died from cancer in 2005. Jennifer was an intellectually curious young woman who received a degree in electrical engineering from Weber State College in Utah. After she received her degree, she moved back to Rochester to take a position at Eastman Kodak Company.

After Jennifer's death in 2005, her family and friends established the Jennifer Grimes Lindley scholarship in her memory.
