# **GAYNELLE WETHERS**

"Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere" Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

### Could 2018 be the Year of Movements??

As we begin this year, this theme may well be the mantra that carries us through.

In the aftermath of the recent election in Alabama, I felt it important to reread Dr. King's Letter from the Birmingham Jail. A profound quote states: "I am cognizant of the interrelatedness of all communities and states. I cannot sit idly by in Atlanta and not be concerned about what happens in Birmingham. Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere. We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly, affects all indirectly. Never again can we afford to live with a narrow, provincial "outsider agitator" idea. Anyone who lives inside the United States can never be considered an outsider anywhere within its bounds."

Viola Luizzo understood and took to heart King's message. A housewife and mother of five, she was an active NAACP member in Detroit. Shocked at watching Black protesters being brutalized on television she took action. She decided to join the four day, 54-mile walk from Selma to Montgomery. With her bags packed, she told her husband, "It's everybody's fight."

Luizzo was murdered by a car full of Klansman who pulled alongside her vehicle and opened fire. She was shot in the head and died instantly. She was 39 years old, murdered because she marched supporting voting rights in Alabama in 1965.

Today, we are again witnessing King's words come alive. With the recent victory in Alabama, it was the demonstration of "The Vote" from those communities that historically been left out or suppressed that secured the victory. What a tribute to Viola and the four young girls murdered by the Klan!

**There is a Movement:** The "#metoo" movement addresses sexual harassment that has long been kept silenced. It was thought to be a one or two day media story but that was not the case.

There is a Movement: The "#Sayhername" movement strives to "address the invisibilization of black women within the mainstream media" and raise awareness of black women who are the victims of police brutality. Quiet as it is kept in some corridors, this movement will hit the national scene in a more profound way.

There is a Movement: On January 20, 2018 in at Women's Rights National Historical Park in Seneca Falls, the birthplace of women's rights in America will hold a celebration and rally called "perSister for Women's Equality." Its focus will be "ending systemic racism, sexism, environmental justice, eradicating violence against women, gender parity in elected office, LGBTQIA, immigrant and disability rights, equal pay and reproductive rights/self-sovereignty."

### There is a Movement!

It is the work of women, women's organizations and advocacy groups that will bring our communities and our nation to a more just, equal and caring society.

This is my hope.

Today it's a combination of Italian dishes along with favorites from my Polish mother-in-law, Helen, who whipped up homemade Pierogi and Golumpki (cabbage rolls) from scratch. Her Kolachi cookies (with pineapple jelly and nuts) traveled to us in Norfolk Virginia many years while my husband was in service. Helen was a patient teacher who imparted much knowledge and direction in how to make her son's favorite foods. So it is the intoxicating aroma of special foods that delight my salivary glands and the smell of a fresh cut Christmas tree (we bought our first at night time in Virginia and discovered in the morning that it had been spray painted Emerald green) and bayberry candles burning every New Year that make me happy to be alive!

This year has been quite stressful with the threat of nuclear war from North Korea not to mention the fires, bombings, tornadoes and earthquakes around -the world. People have suffered enormous losses and tragedies around the world. I asked myself, what can I do to help those in need? My time, money and volunteerism for a special project could make a difference and that is what I propose to do in the New Year. Let each of us find a way to help others - volunteering to help the Refugee Program here in Rochester or researching other non-profits is a beginning. GRAB can make a huge difference as we have 103 members to take on a project together. We could form a committee to volunteer right here at our own Women Helping Women Program. 2017 was a major learning experience starting with the Rochester Landmark Society House and Garden tour. We were amazed how many people came and loved our House and Tours. We expanded the Suffrage Display and GRAB AAUW History and Archives display, we revised the house history and brought in college and university faculty from Brockport, RIT and the University of Rochester to help with displays. We incorporated students from Baden Street in our the Centennial Suffrage Picnic and displays.

Involving youth is key to Project 2020 which will come to fruition in years 2018-2020. We plan to explore the possibilities of partnering with other community organizations such as the Matilda Joslyn Gage House and their Girl Ambassador Program. 


### **TEA AND TITLES**
