## FROM OUR PRESIDENT, GAYNELLE WETHERS

"When a stranger sojourns with you on your land, you shall not do him (her) wrong. You shall treat the stranger who sojourns with you as the native among you and you shall love him(her) as yourself for you were stranger in the land of Egypt." Leviticus 19:33-34

Welcoming the Stranger!



When I first moved into our neighborhood years ago, I was greeted by a group called the "Welcome Wagon." Hostesses were assigned to visit new homeowners and present each with a gift basket. The basket was filled with "goodies" such as cookies and coupons. I was made to feel welcomed and supported. In Pam Sherman's (aka the Suburban Outlaw) article titled "Rochester Won't Wear Out Its Welcome on My Watch (Democrat and Chronicle, August 11, 2016), Ms. Sherman comments on the "Welcome Wagon" hostess, Jeanne, who showed up on her doorstep with cookies. She goes on to say that Jeanne would bake the cookies and Ms. Sherman would give the wine. They were the unofficial "Welcome Wagon." "Even though Jeanne was long gone, the practice of welcoming others have continued." According to Ms. Sherman, "with each welcome, we all have a chance at expanding our horizons."

This practice of welcoming occurs in our local community, especially in our places of worship. If you notice, some businesses have adopted the concept. Greeters at Walmart welcomes customers as they enter the store, K Mart announces welcome to its shoppers over the intercom, and "Moe's Southwest Grill" welcomes its customers as they enter. Even Rite-Aid does the same.

Here at GRAB AAUW, our practice is to greet each other at our many events. Recently, we "Welcomed the Stranger" in our mist as we greeted our guest speaker Dr. Elsie Scott from out of town to provide some remarks at our evening reception for COPE.

Today however, we are witnessing in real time fear of the stranger in our mist. An example, the record number of children from Central America crossing the Mexico-U.S. border unaccompanied by parents, according to P.T.Tobia in the June 20, 2014 article. They are fleeing from violence at home. However, upon arriving here, instead of "Welcoming the Stranger" they are greeted with anti-immigration activists protesting with signs outside the U.S. Border Patrol Station in California. What meaning does this give to the words engraved on the pedestal of the Statue of Liberty: "Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free."

And what about the refugees who are citizens of their countries, but now fleeing war torn countries?

Who are these new immigrants??? Who are these refugees??? Who are these homeless children arriving in our communities???

Do we really believe the words etched on the Statue of Liberty: "Send these, the homeless, tempest-tossed to me, I lift my lamp beside the golden door!"

Are we "welcoming all the immigrants and refugees to our shores seeking freedom and a place to live from foreign lands?"

Are we going to build a wall? Are we going to require new neighbors to speak English? Are we going to require them to be people of means?

Senator John McCain recently received the Medal of Liberty and said "[w]e live in a land made of ideals, not blood and soil."

Do we really live in a land of ideals? If so, what are you willing to do? What are we willing to do? Harriet Tubman once said : "I had crossed the line. I was free but there was no one to welcome me to the land of freedom. I was a stranger in a strange land."

I had the great fortune to meet her! Hope you have the chance to read her book! Worthwhile Read!




TEA AND TITLES will meet at 2PM on Wednesday, NOVEMBER 16<sup>th</sup> at the Clubhouse.
