# NOVEMBER MEETING RECAP: DR. EMILYE CROSBY

"We who believe in freedom cannot rest until it comes." Dr. Arlette Miller Smith encouraged members to sing along as she introduced guest speaker Dr. Emilye Crosby at the November 20<sup>th</sup> branch meeting. Dr. Emilye Crosby is an educator, activist, historian, writer, and editor. Her presentation was about the role of women in the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) and its historic involvement in the civil rights movement. The SNCC emerged out of sit ins during the civil rights movement, promoted voter registration, peaceful protest, community engagement, and elevating marginalized voices. SNCC members such as Jean Wheeler, Ella Baker, and Judy Richardson were central to the movement. Women in SNCC challenged traditional gender roles and modeled an egalitarian democracy, paving way for many other current forward-thinking grassroot social and political organizations.

Dr. Crosby shared her experience growing up in Port Gibson, Mississippi and attending an integrated school just two years after the Supreme Court Brown vs the Board of Education ruling. At school she learned about the civil rights movement from her grade schoolteachers and at home from her father who taught at an HBCU (Historically Black Colleges and Universities). She was inspired by activists like Ella Baker. Crosby wrote a book, *A Little Taste of Freedom: The Black Freedom Struggle in Claiborne County, Mississippi*, a detailed exploration of the freedom struggle and impact of the civil rights movement on local communities after the 1982 Supreme Court victory in the case NAACP vs Claiborne Hardware company.

Dr. Crosby brought along three of her students; they helped pass out resources such as the Women & Gender Toolkit, a SNCC Digital Gateway packet, and other information on the SNCC legacy. Dr. Crosby left the audience better informed on SNCC, civil rights history, and inspired for future peaceful protest and grassroots movements.
